Firewalls and Network Security

There is only one-way to guarantee that your network will not be hacked: Disconnect your network from the Internet. As this is not a feasible option for companies anymore, IT staffs are making their networks 99% hacker proof through the use of a firewall.

A firewall is a system designed to prevent unauthorized access to or from a private network. Firewalls can be implemented in both hardware and software or a combination of both. Firewalls are frequently used to prevent unauthorized Internet users from accessing private networks connected to the Internet. All messages entering or leaving your network pass through the firewall, which examines each message and blocks those that do not meet the specified security criteria.

The main objective with network security is to hide your network from the Internet as best you can. The most common way to do this is through the use of a proxy server. The proxy server stands in for all PCs that are connected to the Internet. If a hacker is trying to find information on your network, he will only see the proxy server from the outside. There should not be any data on this server, so that even if hacked, the proxy server will hold no valuable information. Most often, the proxy server is only one of the many functions that a firewall provides.

The proxy server is only the beginning step that you need to take to protect your network. The more valuable the data that sits on your corporate network, the more important network security and firewalls become.


On November 1, 2001, the Chamber will offer a half-day seminar on how to tap into government contracting. This informative program will feature Dr. Beatrice Tignor, Director of the Montgomery County Office of Procurement, who will present a discussion of local government needs and business opportunities for small and medium businesses. Scott Orbach, President of EZGSA will present information about the GSA schedule, and how by pre-contracting goods and services with

the GSA, a vendor could make their goods and services available to the US government in the quickest, easiest and most efficient way. Louise Wager of United Bank will highlight various ways of financing the sales made to the US Government. A representative from the Small Business Administration is expected to help identify resources for small businesses contracting with the government for the first time.

Legislative Update

Light Rail – Time for a Decision!!

The transitway would extend 4.4 miles from the Bethesda Metro Station to the Silver Spring Transit Center, serving as a convenient connection between the Glenmont and Shady Grove legs of the Metro Red Line. A substantial portion of the alignment would follow a former railroad right-of-way, acquired by Montgomery County in 1988. An accompanying hiker/biker trail is an important element of the project. The transitway / trail is supported by Bethesda and Silver Spring land use master plans.

Trolley, Light Rail, Transitway. Regardless of what it is called, it is an idea whose time has come, and the

decision-making window of opportunity to secure needed state and federal funding is running short.


Important in its own right, the Bethesda/Silver Spring Transitway recently has been discussed as a possible component of a larger, more expansive, Inner-Beltway Purple Line, linking Montgomery and Prince George's Counties with other Washington area jurisdictions. At issue is whether to choose an inner or outer Beltway alignment for the Purple Line, and if the inner alignment is favored, whether the Bethesda/Silver Spring Transitway as contemplated by the master plans should be part of that alignment. A decision is expected soon from the Governor.

In a recent letter to Governor Glendening, the Greater Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chamber of Commerce expressed its strong support for the Bethesda/Silver Spring Light Rail Transitway. Among other things, the Chamber pointed out the need for a direct, convenient rail connection between Montgomery County's two largest inside-the-Beltway job centers, which cannot rely on increased vehicular traffic because of limited road capacity and safety considerations. The Chamber stated that since the government has acquired the existing right-of-way, there would be limited need for further land acquisition and taking of private property. The resultant savings in time and expense would make a significant difference in the overall cost of the project. Finally, the Chamber recognized that a light rail link between Bethesda and Silver Spring, along the existing right-of-way, could be an important initial component in a more comprehensive effort such as the Purple Line linking job centers in Montgomery and Prince George's Counties.

Hoping for a favorable decision, our chamber is working closely with county and state elected officials and other business and civic groups to see that light rail is allowed to move forward into the next stage of engineering and environment impact study.



Employee Dress Codes, or "Men in Tights"

When the demand for employees outpaced the supply, some employers felt they had to relax their dress codes just to stay competitive. First it was casual summertime Fridays, then casual summertime, then just plain casual

Now, as the job market shrinks, there seems to be a trend back to more traditional office attire. In re-imposing standards, what legal issues should an employer be concerned about?

- **Business necessity.** Maryland's Fair Employment Practices Act permits an employer to establish standards for dress and grooming if the standards are "directly related to the nature of the employment of the employee." For employees who have contact with clients or customers, or with the public generally, this should not be a difficult test to satisfy.
- *Basic fairness*. "Casual" can mean anything from a comfortable old sports jacket with leather elbow patches to a beer-stained T-shirt and jeans; from a blouse and slacks to a bare midriff. Since tastes differ as to what is acceptable, a dress code should be in writing, it should be as specific as possible, and it should be well-publicized. The consequences of a violation such being sent home without pay to change should also be spelled out.
- Safety concerns. Loose sleeves or a billowing skirt may pose a safety hazard around machinery or in a lab where toxic chemicals or biologics are used. In certain industries where OSHA regulations apply, employers not only may, but they must, require their workers to wear personal protective equipment such as hard hats, safety glasses, face masks, latex gloves, steel-tipped shoes, etc.
- *Gender discrimination*. Employers should be careful to enforce dress codes even-handedly. If women get sent home for wearing jeans, men doing similar jobs should be sent home, too. Depending on the circumstances, however, it may be permissible for employers to impose a gender-appropriate dress code. Court decisions have generally upheld rules prohibiting earrings or long hair for men but not for women where the employer legitimately wants to present a more conservative, less trendy image.
- Religious discrimination. An employer probably cannot prohibit employees from wearing religious garb, such as crucifixes, yarmulkes, or chadors unless they pose a genuine safety hazard.
- Accommodating disabilities. Employers may have to relax dress code requirements from time to time to accommodate persons with disabilities. Use of a prosthetic device, for example, may make it impossible to comply with strict dress code standards. Or an employee may have a sensitivity or allergic reaction to the fabrics in a uniform.
- Union insignia. Prohibiting employees from wearing union buttons or insignia is an unfair labor practice in violation of the National Labor Relations Act.
